Roly's Report

With April been and gone supposedly we are rolling into the cooler months but with virtually no southerlies it looks like we will be enjoying an Indian summer. So don't be surprised if we see a few more marlin yet as offshore temps have only just dipped into the 19's so well and truly warm enough still for gamefish. The skippies have remained in that 50-70m water and have been as thick as ever, in fact it would pay to grab a few to hold over for the Hunting & Fishing Snapper Classic in a few weeks' time.

The Top Boat is going to take some catching with Bandit now having a commanding lead, however the leading angler is not so clear cut. Another 7 weeks in the fishing season so it's sure to be an exciting race to the finish.

The High Safe Solutions Billfish Bonanza always heralds the tail end of the game season with this year the weather making things a bit tougher on the crews ultimately affecting both angler numbers and the overall fish numbers. Again thanks to Deryk who manned channel 66 for the weekend which almost turned into a full time shark recording affair. You can find a full report later on in Game Fisher.

The Okuma Take a Kid Fishing was a boomer this year with 68 kids turning out to enjoy a good day though the North Easter was a bit brisk in the morning confining most of us to in and around the mount. A great addition to the event this year was the trophy for the best kids fish pic kindly sponsored by NZ Bayfisher Magazine. More on the kids later in this issue..

After 23years of outstanding service to the marine community the Sea Coms team have hung up the VHF's for the last time on the 31st April. A sincere thank you must go to the entire crew for the incredible dedication to the listening watches and support shown for all our members when at sea.

The Club has rescued VHF channel 3 and channel 24 for boaties to use, and they will for now stay on air but with no radio operator, although Coastguard have offered a listening watch channel 3. All trip reports can

be done through channel 83, and members are invited to use VHF channel three as a fishing chat channel.

The Club is having a change in caterers. After four years of looking after the members we say farewell to Jen and Andrew Watts who are taking up a business opportunity in Melbourne. The restaurant and kitchen will be closed for maintenance and fit out from the 23rd-31st May. We are very excited about our new appointment with Darren Gussy and Helen Gussy Thornton (owners of Delissi in the Mount) due to roll up the shutters for the first time on the 1st June. We are looking forward to bringing you the new menu in the coming weeks...it looks great!

Keep em Tight Roly







Hi all. This month the absolute highlight for me was attending the NZ Marine Research Foundation symposium on the value of Recreational Fishing to the NZ economy, where the preliminary result of the survey conducted by Southwick & Associates were presented. Southwicks themselves are internationally acclaimed for their work with various government and international agencies and their results are currently being peer reviewed before being finalised, however the results thus far are quite staggering.

The list of speakers was impressive, from Daniel Pauly who is a professor and well known for developing the 'shifting baselines' concept and exposing the effects of fishing down marine food webs. Daniel is project leader for the Sea Around Us international catch reconstruction study based out of the University of British Columbia. Also Dr Evelyn Pinkerton , a maritime anthropologist from Simon Fraser University. She has played a key role in developing the theory and practice of power-sharing and stewardship through co-management agreements in various parts of Canada and North America. In New Zealand, Dr Glen Simmons from Auckland University has spent a huge amount of time preparing catch reconstruction data for New Zealand from the 1950's till the 2010's and has recently published some (frankly) disturbing results for this country.

There was quite a varied collection of attendees, many from groups or interests who you would not expect to have much in common with recreational fishermen however by the end of the three days there was very much a shared concern about the path that New Zealand is taking with regard to our fisheries management. The test will be whether some momentum can be achieved in addressing the concerns that are obvious right across the board, and in getting our Government agencies to recognise not only the research work and also the value of working with the recreational and customary sectors, rather than being led by commercial interests and a Ministry who is tasked by Government in "doubling the export value of our fisheries based exports by 2025". NINE short years away!

For me, personally, I cannot see the merit of exporting the likes of Kahawai for less than \$10 a kilo, to be turned into pet food or used for cray bait, when that same Kahawai can earn something well in excess of \$50 to the NZ economy if it were to be caught by a recreational fisherman. Simplistic, I know, however that for me is the reality. Why would you literally give such a valuable resource away, especially when it has probably cost most of that \$10 to catch it commercially. And that export \$\$ is probably going into the bank account of a foreign owned or controlled company!!



CLUB MEMBERSHIP NIGHTS & End of Year Ham nights.




Just a reminder that our Club nights are Tuesday and Thursday every week, with participation during the year rewarding regular attendance at the end of year Ham Raffles.

Well done to everyone that turned out and thanks to Okuma, Peter Hartford and our other sponsors for their generosity!!!









The last blue water tournament for the year got underway on the Friday morning in less than ideal conditions with an un-waiving 15 knot northeaster making the going manageable but with 20knots in the forecast again many of the boats favoured a bit of cover from Mayor. The western side of Mayor (the Glass Art Sponsors Grid) had been holding fish for weeks so fishing close to the island was a pretty good option considering Saturday morning looked to be much of the same but then we were due to see an easing forecast in the afternoon.

Awesome to have Doug Stewart on board with his new business Higher Safe Solutions (our new naming sponsor) and perfectly complimented with Rob Bolton of Petroleum Logistics joining the team on Ocean Monarch and of course a new sponsor to this event. The Ocean Monarch crew again shot northwards to their happy hunting ground in the aptly named Higher Safe Solutions grid!

Day one started of quietly with most of the hook-ups coming in the afternoon. Freelance II seemed to be hooked up for a long time in what finally materialised into a large shark and from that point on the sharky theme continued. The exception to this was when Pasador hooked up to a large stripey that did what those big fish do and simply shook the hook free on the first big run. The only confident bites came from the sharks and it was a chorus line that became too familiar as the day came to a close with no tournament fish on the board. Despite this the crews still sounded up beat on the VHF as they pulled into the various anchorages around the place no doubt plotting day two and the fortunes they may find given the improving weather.

Saturday saw the boats stretching their legs a little more with noticeably more boats out wider and further north in the All About Construction and High Duty Plastics grids and it wasn't long before the fish were located. The Jensen family boat Reality ran north from Mayor and happened across some much better water holding bait and then whamo! A nice stripey was hooked for Australian angler David Hudson, and it wasn't long before this crack team had the fish at the boat. Later this was weighed in at 144.6kg and ended up taking 1st place in the Striped Marlin category....(bloody aussies!) The rest of the day saw lots of skippies, sharks

eating skippies and a fast depletion of game hooks as the men in grey suits proceeded to ransack livie after livie.

Sunday, of course the shortest day meant the pressure was on, after all it had been a low scoring two days and with great prizes up for grabs we just needed for the fish to bite. Charlie Champness off the trailer boat King Hit had towed his boat north to launch from Tairua. Obviously Charlie had had some intel and now had the theory the body of stripies had relocated from Mayor and pushed northwards to the Aldies (All About Construction grid)...he was bang on! Charlie tagged two nice stripies in the morning barely half an hour apart while the big boats continued to search wide.

Pasador persisted with their west Mayor spot where they had dropped the big fish the previous day and were to be rewarded as with a solid bite that finally stuck and it was this time to be a stripey, not one of those hook taxers. Eventually the crew subdued a very respectable 124.7kg fish that was to take second place and all in their very own Glass Art grid. There seems to be a pattern of sponsors fishing their own grids this year and doing very well...very cool.

The midmorning bite was to be the making of the event as Bandit joined the party calling in a hook up and this time it was a swordfish with Rob Ofsoski on the rod. Fifty minutes later a nice fish of 129.3kg rolled to the surface and was good enough to take first place in the billfish section

Minutes later Freelance II called in as hooked up well north of Mayor in High Duty plastics and well out of shark territory. Within 20mins a nice tuna was called in for angler Ray Green but they were still 30miles from home. With no choice the boys had to open the 50 footer up to get back in time. With only two minutes left on the clock Ray made it to the weigh station and managed to hang the nice Yellowfin tuna up that pulled the scales to 33.2kg and in doing so scooped first place Tuna!

Thanks to all of our anglers that fished this one, and remember to keep that Sword gear on board as the Team Theo Broadbill Challenge starts on the 1st May and runs all month! Catch you in the Club.




